# Minnesota Child Care Assistance Program

## State Fiscal Year 2017 Family Profile



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## Introduction

The [Child Care Assistance Program](#) provides financial assistance to help families with low incomes pay for child care so that parents may pursue employment or education leading to employment, and that children are well cared for and prepared to enter school ready to learn.

The Minnesota Family Investment Program and the Diversionary Work Program help families work toward economic stability. The state fully funds child care assistance for families who participate in either program through the [Minnesota Family Investment Program and Diversionary Work Program Child Care Assistance Program](#), or who have recently moved off the programs through [Transition Year or Transition Year Extension Child Care Assistance Program](#). Family profile reporting on Minnesota Family Investment Program child care includes children and families served by these subprograms.

The [Basic Sliding Fee Child Care Assistance Program](#), a capped allocation, assists families with low incomes who are not participating in the Minnesota Family Investment Program or Diversionary Work Program, with child care costs. Family Profile reporting on Basic Sliding Fee child care includes children and families served by the portability pool.

Families may select any legal child care provider including licensed child care centers, licensed family child care homes, centers that are exempt from licensing — typically because they offer care to school-aged children or the programs are located in a school — or legal nonlicensed providers — typically family or friends who meet certain program requirements.

There are [maximum rates](#) that the Child Care Assistance Program can pay providers caring for children. These maximum rates are set by the Minnesota Legislature and vary according to age of the child, unit of time (hourly, daily or weekly) and the location where care is provided. Providers who meet certain quality standards can be paid [15](#) or [20](#) percent more than the standard rates.

### Data source

Data on children and families reported in the family profile is drawn from the Minnesota Electronic Child Care eligibility and payment system for State Fiscal Year 2014–17, unless otherwise noted.





Percent of children served by the Minnesota Family Investment Program Child Care Program





<sup>1</sup> Monthly average percentage of children by race and ethnicity served during the state fiscal year. Race and ethnicity data is reported by applicants. The coding method for race/ethnicity follows the 2000 U.S. Census methodology, with participants asked their racial choice (yes or no) of each of five racial categories (American Indian, Asian, African-American, Pacific Islander, and white) and ethnicity (Hispanic or non-Hispanic). Hispanics of all races were listed as Hispanic. Pacific Islander and Asian groups were combined due to very small numbers of Pacific Islanders. The American Indian group also includes Alaskan natives. Small changes from previous state fiscal year reports are due to minor changes in data methodology.





Reported provider prices are typically compared to [the maximum rates in effect](#)<sup>3</sup> on the last day of the calendar year in which the [survey of licensed child care providers](#) was completed. The percent of provider prices fully covered is calculated by dividing the number of prices that are at or below the applicable standard maximum rate by the total number of all provider prices reported.

Percent of provider prices fully covered varies across counties within these metro and non-metro regions.

<sup>3</sup> The 2016 and 2014 prices were compared to the current maximum rates set on Feb. 3, 2014. The 2012 and 2011 prices were compared to the maximum rates set on Nov. 28, 2011. The 2006-10 prices were compared to the maximum rates set on July 1, 2006. The 2005 prices were compared to the maximums set Jan. 1, 2006.



In 2016, Minnesota’s current standard maximum rates covered approximately 22 percent of the prices charged by family child care providers and approximately 29 percent of the prices charged by child care centers in Minnesota.

For child care providers meeting criteria for the quality rate differentials, these differentials allow more of the prices they charged to be fully covered. The impact of the differentials on percent of rates covered varies dependent upon the differential type and the geographic region. The 15 percent quality differential fully covered approximately 45 percent of the prices charged by family child care providers and approximately 49 percent of the prices charged by child care centers. The 20 percent quality differential fully covered approximately 49 percent of the prices charged by family child care providers and approximately 35 percent of the prices charged by child care centers.

<sup>1</sup> The Child Care Assistance Program has higher maximum rates that can be paid to providers meeting certain quality standards. Providers rated Four-Stars by Parent Aware are eligible for a [20 percent differential](#) while Three-Star Rated providers and those with certain accreditations or educational credentials are eligible for a [15 percent differential](#).
